At the end of last term Year 2 followed a guided tour to learn more about the Great Fire of London. Our brilliant guides, Margaret and Philippa, showed us how to be detectives finding historical clues hidden within modern day London. We visited the monument built by Christopher Wren in memory of the fire and of course Pudding Lane, where it all started. We all had a wonderful day and the children were able to recall their knowledge they had already learnt in class. We were able to write using quills, dress up as Mr and Mrs Pepys, as well as explore historical ruins to understand what life would have been like at the time of the fire. News from the Office

Attendance- Mrs. L .Pryor

Congratulations to all pupils who achieved certificates for 100% attendance at the end of the Spring term. Congratulations to the whole school, we managed 96.3%, and Year 5, St Thomas who achieved the best class attendance, 97.6%, a brilliant success.

The Government's policy on school attendance shares the importance of school attendance. For more detailed information please see

<https://www.surreycc.gov.uk/schools-and-learning/schools/at-school/attendance-and-absence> 91% attendance now initiates the involvement of the Educational Welfare Officer (EWO). As this equates to a child missing one afternoon each week on average, this affects the child's attainment. Where a child's absence from school gives cause for concern, the education welfare officer works with everyone involved to create an action plan supporting full-time attendance and will stay involved until this is achieved. Legal action may be taken to ensure your child attends school.

We are blessed - as you value your child's education so highly we have an excellent attendance record of 96.8% since September, a record we are keen to build upon.

Penalty Notices for unauthorised absence – Mrs. L. Pryor

Please be aware that The Education (Pupil Registration)(England) (Amendment) Regulations 2013 state that headteachers may not grant any leave of absence during term time unless

there are exceptional circumstances. The headteacher should determine the number of school days a child can be away from school if leave is granted.

In accordance with the above Regulations, requests for leave of absence are treated sympathetically, but only in exceptional circumstances can they be approved. The policy of the Government to which this school has agreed, states that parents who take their child out of school for five days or more during term time, without the authority of the Headteacher, will each be liable to receive a penalty notice. Penalty Notices will be issued by the Local Authority.

The penalty is £60 if paid within 21 days of receipt of the notice, rising to £120 if paid after 21 days but within 28 days of receipt of the notice. If the penalty is not paid in full by the end of the 28-day period the Local Authority must prosecute the recipient for failing to ensure regular school attendance under section 444 Education Act 1996.

Please be aware that each parent is liable to receive a Penalty Notice for each child who incurs unauthorised absences, for example, if there are two parents and one child, each parent will receive one Penalty Notice.

If there are two parents and two children incurring unauthorised absences, each parent will receive two Penalty Notices, which in this case would amount to £120 each if paid within 21 days.

Pupil Leave of Absence- Mrs. L. Pryor

If you wish to request permission to take your child out of school, in accordance with our Attendance Policy a minimum of five working days notice must be given. Please email Mrs DeMorais directly at head@stpauls-thamesditton.surrey.sch.uk giving dates and reason for absence, then attach a copy of her response to your completed 'Pupil Absence Form' before handed in to the office. Evidence of some sort should also be attached. Without this, the absence will be unauthorised and will show on your child's school report.

The timetable and booking forms are now live on the school's website. Please complete these forms and return them to the school office via book bags. Please note that there are a number of dates during the summer term when clubs will not be running and these are stated on the individual booking forms. Please make a note of these dates.

Parents of children with special medical needs must inform the leaders of any afterschool clubs that they attend. Those leaders will need to be in a position to deal with any medical emergency that may arise. The school office staff will assist only if they are available, but the leaders may need to contact the parents directly.
